# What's Going On in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)?

## An Analysis of Amendment 10-A

By now many of you have likely heard that the majority of the presbyteries in the denomination have ratified an amendment to the Book of Order (part of our denomination's constitution) that eliminates a clause which prevents anyone from being ordained to office who is sexually active outside of the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman. In essence, the clause was created to prevent practicing homosexuals from ordination; effective July 10, 2011, the clause will be null and void. The relevant paragraph of the Book of Order, before and after the amendment (referred to as Amendment 10-A), is shown below:

The former standard for those who hold ordained office:

*Those who are called to office in the church are to lead a life in obedience to Scripture and in conformity to the historic confessional standards of the church. Among these standards is the requirement to live either in fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman (W-4.9001), or chastity in singleness. Persons refusing to repent of any self-acknowledged practice which the confessions call sin shall not be ordained and/or installed as deacons, elders, or ministers of the Word and Sacrament.*

The new standard for those who hold ordained office (once Amendment 10-A takes effect):

*Standards for ordained service reflect the church's desire to submit joyfully to the Lordship of Jesus Christ in all aspects of life (G-1.0000). The governing body responsible for ordination and/or installation (G.14.0240; G-14.0450) shall examine each candidate's calling, gifts, preparation, and suitability for the responsibilities of office. The examination shall include, but not be limited to, a determination of the candidate's ability and commitment to fulfill all requirements as expressed in the constitutional questions for ordination and installation (W-4.4003). Governing bodies shall be guided by Scripture and the confessions in applying standards to individual candidates.*

The effects of the amendment will be numerous, some of which we won't be able to predict. This amendment effectively places the responsibility of determining suitability for ordination in the hands of each individual governing body: the session, for ordaining elders and deacons; and the presbytery, for ordaining ministers of word and sacrament. Thus, one church's or presbytery's standards for its officers may differ from the standards of the church or presbytery just down the road, making transferability of ordination from one church to another or one presbytery to another potentially problematic. With this amendment, there will no longer be a uniform standard in our denomination applied to all candidates for ordination or membership in a presbytery.

The language of the amendment is neutral, neither for nor against the ordination of practicing homosexual persons. It neither forces a governing body to ordain practicing homosexuals, nor does it prohibit governing bodies from doing so. It simply places the responsibility for interpretation of Scripture and the confessions (our Church's historical theological interpretations of scripture) in the local governing bodies.

There are some who use the word “apostasy” to describe the action and implications of the amendment. On the other hand, there are also those who welcome the action as the end of “homophobia” in the PC(USA). I would caution against the use of such strong and divisive language. The truth is, the Church of Jesus Christ has never been immune from disagreement and error, whether we are talking about how to interpret the substance of the bread and the juice at communion, or the Church’s teaching concerning slavery, or the treatment of women in the church and society, or how does one define “just” war, or how to convert the “heathens” in other lands, or what constitutes usury (you didn’t think I was going to let the bankers off the hook, did you?!)—you name the divisive issue, and the chances are the Church has been less than perfect in its position, and often in disagreement. This doesn’t excuse our errors, it just reinforces our need to remain engaged with our sinful and broken world and with one another in the church (which, as it so happens, is also filled with sinful and broken people!) through a message of grace and mercy, with a posture of humility.

There are some who say this issue is the “deal breaker,” and so they are ready to walk away. Again, I don’t agree. In fact, I believe it is even more incumbent upon those who disagree with one another to find ways to stay and work together—that is a much greater witness to the reconciling power of the gospel of Jesus Christ. The people who have fought the former standard for so many years didn’t leave when the action with which they disagreed was taken; they remained faithful churchmen and women, and they worked joyfully alongside those with whom they disagreed. I believe that there is in such a response a model for those who now disagree with the new standard.

My chief concerns surrounding the passage of the amendment are more directed at what will happen to the denomination and to local churches, more than the content of the amendment itself. In my five years of service on the Committee on Ministry of New Harmony Presbytery, I have seen too many times the pain that is inflicted within the church when people refuse to work through their differences in humility and love. I have watched other denominations experience the painful fallout of churches in exodus over various issues, dividing family loyalties and destroying life-long friendships. I don’t believe that leaving is the option to pursue; it is an option that our world encourages, and it only further taints our witness to the reconciling power of Christ. Furthermore, the time, energy, and material resources required to leave will distract us from engaging in vital ministry in other areas.

I have urged our session to avoid panicking in response to the amendment. What is required is a well-reasoned, grace-filled, truth-seeking response that acknowledges with sensitivity the broad range of emotions surrounding this amendment. Everyone who walks through the doors of this church is a child of God created in the image of God, and all should be accorded the dignity of respect. In the months ahead, we will consider ways to respond that maintain the integrity of our values, while enabling us to remain engaged with the Presbyterian Church near and far.

Please know that our session will wrestle with how the changes in our denomination’s polity will affect us, and we will formulate responses as we deem necessary. In the meantime, be reminded that God has faithfully blessed and led this congregation in ministry for over a century. Regardless of the challenges we face, God’s faithfulness will never change. Let us, therefore, remain united in our mission to love and lead all people to deeper life in Jesus Christ.

We should end 2011 with at least a breakeven financial situation or hopefully a small surplus.

# MANNA IN THE MORNING

## **Lectio Divina**

Use lectio divina in your daily reading of scripture by reading a few verses of the Bible. Read unhurriedly and listen for the message God has for you. Stay alert to connections to the Spirit that may reveal the passage and what is going on in your life. Once you have heard a word that is meant for you, you are naturally drawn to prayer. Pour your heart to God. Read, reflect, respond and rest — this is the basic rhythm of divine reading.

1. Read the scripture slowly.
2. Reflect on a word or phrase.
3. Respond to what you have read.
4. Rest in God’s word.

Won’t you take time to each day to let God speak to you through His Word? Listed below is a series of daily readings from the Bible. There is a single text listed for each weekday and Saturday; the Sunday texts are the Old Testament, Epistle and Gospel lectionary selections that are incorporated into our worship services (Note: during the time between Easter and Pentecost, the Old Testament lesson is replaced by a reading from Acts). One suggestion for daily reading would be to engage with the text through a process known as “Lectio Divina” (a Latin term that simply means “Divine Reading”).
